Miss Rumphius by Barbara Cooney, 1982

As a child Great-aunt Alice Rumphius resolved that when she grew up she would go to faraway places, live by the sea in her old age, and do something to make the world more beautiful--and she does all those things, the last being the most difficult of all.

City green by DyAnne DiSalvo-Ryan, 1994

Marcy and Miss Rosa start a campaign to clean up an empty lot and turn it into a community garden.

The curious garden by Peter Brown, 2009

Liam discovers a hidden garden and with careful tending spreads color throughout the gray city.

Home by Jeannie Baker, 2004

A wordless picture book that observes the changes in a neighborhood from before a girl is born until she is an adult, as it first decays and then is renewed by the efforts of the residents.
